CONNECTING THROUGH COMMUNITY SERVICE

A supportive community is essential to a successful not-for-profit, and one of the ways that this assistance shines brightest is through local service organizations. For The Lending Cupboard™, the Rotary Club of Red Deer East has been one of those consistent sources of support over the years. A few weeks ago, club members joined several other local service organizations and cleaned TLC from top to bottom. It was all part of Community Service Week.

"It's a collaborative service week, so the Rotary Clubs join with Kinsmen, Kiwanis, Lions, and Optimists, and we pick five projects over five days," explained Sharon Moffat, co-president of Rotary Club of Red Deer East. "And then we all join together to do the projects. We are a service club, and this is what we do anyway, as our members want to volunteer," she said.

Volunteers pitched in for the project at TLC and, as mentioned, gave the facility a thorough cleaning. "TLC is a small organization as far as staff goes, and the facility hadn't had a deep cleaning since they've been there. So, we went in and moved all the equipment out of the way. We vacuumed, mopped all the floors, did the windows. There is so much equipment in there that it's not something you can do on a day-to-day basis," she explained. "It was a good day! We made quick work out of it with 15 people, too."

Moffat said other TLC initiatives the club has supported include selling programs at the annual CFR here in town. "Also, one of our past presidents was on the charter committee when The Lending Cupboard™ was born, so we have been there since the beginning. We also have members who volunteer at TLC, and we've donated before."

For Moffat, there's also a personal connection to TLC's mission. "I must tell you that my mom died of cancer a few years ago - we were in Ontario then." She recalls noticing how the community didn't have the unique services TLC offers. We had to find equipment to borrow for her, and we actually had to borrow it from the local hospice because there was no facility like this," she said.

"When I looked around TLC today, I was thinking how valuable it is. My mom needed a walker, a commode, and bed rails - she needed a lot of equipment in that last period of her life. So, I appreciate that we have this kind of service here, and I don't think people sometimes know what it is. But really, we are so lucky here in Red Deer that we don't have to try to figure out that part of the equation because you have enough to worry about when you are in those situations."

Meanwhile, Moffat said there are three Rotary Clubs in Red Deer, each of which has its own identity to a certain extent. "I think that our mission this year is to remind our members that Rotary is bigger than the room we have lunch in - an international organization with 1.2 million members. Our top priority is doing service in the community, and it's also about fellowship. Those things go hand in hand. "So, we consider a day like (our day at TLC) also to be the 'fellowship' part of it," she pointed out. "It's about throwing our jeans on, getting our rubber gloves, and heading to The Lending Cupboard™ to do service together. That's what drives our members - that kind of service and fellowship. It's awesome! It feels so good to do something like that," she said. "And they were just beaming because it was so nice and clean. They were so appreciative. We had some laughs, too. Several guys said I wasn't allowed to take pictures of them doing windows," she chuckled.

Ultimately, offering support across the city and beyond brings a sense of joy and fulfillment that is hard to describe. "It's a sincere, feel-good kind of thing. "I've also enjoyed our association with The Lending Cupboard™, and we will continue to work with them. When they need us, they can certainly call us, and we'll show up with our army!"

THE PROFOUND IMPACT OF TLC: KAROL LUCIANI'S STORY

Every non-profit needs a fantastic supporter like Karol Luciani.

For years now, the Red Deer resident has been enthusiastically cheering on the staff and volunteers at TLC, and it's a commitment born out of personal experience. On virtually every Facebook post, we can count on Karol to put an enthusiastic 'Thank you!' in the comments. He's also been a fabulous public advocate for TLC over the years. During a recent chat, he couldn't say it enough − The Lending Cupboard™ is an organization that has not only served as a profound source of help in his own life but also a unique and much-needed part of the community.

Several years ago, Karol's beloved wife, Wendy, bravely fought cancer, and during her illness, the couple borrowed equipment from TLC before her passing in August of 2017. Karol underwent hip surgery a few years before that, but an infection later set in. "It travelled to my spine, and it paralyzed me. I was in the hospital for 14 months. But I had needed some medical equipment before the operation, and in the ensuing weeks after the operation, we had to adjust, so we borrowed a number of different things."






Again, he recounts how helpful the TLC team was every step of the way. "All the people I have dealt with have been so kind," he said. "I also know a number of people that have volunteered at The Lending Cupboard™, and everyone I have talked to, or anybody who has been associated with them, has been so happy with it," he explained. "You receive a friendly greeting when you go in, and the people are so good at assessing what you need."

Karol also pointed out that there is much more to medical equipment than folks may realize. "A lot of times, a person doesn't even know what they are going to need. Most of these crisis situations happen so fast that you don't know what to do. You can't imagine what you will need when things like this arise. "I think everyone should just walk through there and look around - it's phenomenal to see how much there is," he said. "If a person had to go out and try to buy these things, I don't know what would happen."

Ultimately, Karol is an inspiring and resilient man - his positivity overflows and he holds firmly to an 'attitude of gratitude.' Much of that stems from his faith and also from his care and watchfulness over others, too. "If I hear of someone who has had some kind of a situation that has come about, I always suggest that they go to The Lending Cupboard™ because there are still a lot of people that might not know it's there," he said. "It's an incredible service that allows people to have dignity, comfort, a faster healing process, and to be able to function in life. It goes far beyond the lending of equipment - it's enhancing the quality of people's lives," he added. "I find them to be an incredible organization. I can't imagine what would happen if people didn't have TLC to use."

UNCOVERING ACTS OF GENEROSITY

Robert Schwartz was the kind of person who had community spirit to spare.

Schwartz, who passed away on July 1 of this year, has been described as the kind of guy who would go out of his way to help others, and that help shone through in all kinds of ways. His sense of giving also significantly impacted The Lending Cupboard™ a few years back, as his good friend Robert Bonin recounted recently. "Rob was also my best friend's dad, and he was like a grandfather to my son," said Bonin.

Schwartz loved a good auction sale, where he could find all kinds of treasures to restore to excellent condition. One day, the two men happened upon an auction at Michener Centre. "We saw all of this medical equipment - wheelchairs, walkers, and canes," recalled Bonin. "We walked into this warehouse and saw hundreds of pieces of medical equipment that was to be (gotten rid of) or auctioned off." The guys decided to get in on the bidding. "Someone was bidding against us, so I walked over and asked what they planned on doing with it."

A woman explained that her husband was going to make some money by selling it. "I said, well, our plan is to buy it, re-build it all, and then donate it to The Lending Cupboard™," recalled Bonin with a smile. When she heard that, she quickly pulled her husband out of the bidding. "He waved to the auctioneer and said to pull his bid!" So, Schwartz and Bonin bought the whole lot. "There were probably 40 to 60 wheelchairs in total, and we ended up rebuilding between 30 to 35 of them," he explained. "And there were also between 40 to 50 really nice foldable walkers from the basic model all the way to the fancier ones." There were also about 50 canes that just needed minor repairs.

"We came to TLC, knocked on the back door, and said, "Where do you want all of this? They were just blown away," he laughed. It was typical of Schwartz to think about how to improve someone else's life. "Robert was one of the most intelligent builder-designer kind of guys you could ever meet," Bonin said of his friend. "If it could come apart, he could put it back together. And he was always out helping people. He would give the shirt off his back for a stranger," he added. "He was an incredible person. He was also one of those guys who did things like this behind the scenes and never took any credit for it."





Meanwhile, Bonin's son Leo recently suffered a knee injury, so TLC came to mind. "We walked in there, and one of the ladies said, 'You know, I think I remember that'" referring to that massive donation made by Bonin and Schwartz.

During the course of that recent visit, Bonin was also impressed with how the volunteers helped out Leo as he prepared for surgery. "They couldn't wait to help him. He got a wheelchair, a walker, and a cane." Leo agreed, reflecting on the support he received. "Several volunteers came up to help me, and they were amazing. It was quick; it was efficient. It was really nice to be there."

WELCOME TRACY, TLC'S NEW VOLUNTEER COORDINATOR

Tracy Scotvold knew from the moment she learned of the volunteer coordinator posting at The Lending CupboardTM that she had found a dream position.

Fortunately, she landed the job a few months ago, and it's been an absolute joy settling into the busy routines at TLC. "My first experience with TLC was when a friend of mine was diagnosed with cancer last March," she explained. "Her son was a friend of mine, so we did many runs to The Lending Cupboard™ between us." During that time, as her friend's needs changed, so did the types of medical equipment she required, so it proved to be a learning process. Currently, Scotvold is also helping to care for her elderly parents, so the need for various pieces of equipment is growing.



With a personal knowledge of the profound differences that medical equipment can make in a person's life, the timing for the position couldn't have been better. "I remember when I saw the ad, I was very excited," she said, noting that she's long had a passion for community work, including working for Family Services and putting together life plans for adults with disabilities, among other ventures.

Her wellness journey has also given her a strong empathy for clients, as she has her battle with osteoarthritis. "You think about what you can do for quality of life," she said. "Again, when I saw the ad, I thought, this was so helpful for my friend. I came in, and it was just magical. It was like sitting down with two old friends." she recalled of the interview.

From day one, it has indeed been a super fit. Scotvold said the position suits her because of its very social nature, and also, it's a role that ticks the 'love for helping others' box. "It's a well-rounded thing," she said. "I'm loving it here. I see how many people we help." She's also been deeply inspired by TLC's team of dedicated volunteers. She pointed out how many will take extra shifts above their own to help when needed. "We can always use more volunteers, but it does blow me away to see their dedication. Some have been doing it for ten years or more; it's phenomenal."

To those who are considering a volunteering stint in the community, Scotvold said that TLC is an ideal place to check out. "We've got treats," she said with a laugh. "Really, it's so rewarding. To come together as a common group that has a bigger vision – there's a satisfaction you get out of that. There are also volunteers here who have made life-long friends," she added. "If you are looking for something fun to do, that is meaningful to do, and if you are looking to give back and to help people in need, this is it. "I may be tired when I leave here, but I'm happy! Also, when I go home, I'm very thankful."

Ultimately, the knowledge of how much TLC helps clients provides Scotvold with a foundational sense of fulfillment. The needs are diverse, but time and again the right equipment is readily available. "It's absolutely at the heart of our community," she said. "We have things that can help daily to give quality of life."



"Some of the volunteers that have been there longer have been very resourceful and helpful - they are amazing," she noted. "I really enjoy working there - it's a happy time. Edie said TLC is a great place to start for those looking to volunteer locally. "It's filling a niche for me," she explained. "You are dealing with a segment of the population that, for the most part, is really grateful for what you are doing for them, so that is always a plus," she said, adding that folks are typically pretty relieved that they don't have to purchase the equipment that they may have trouble paying for. "I don't know how many times people have pulled out a debit card or cash to pay for something, and in turn, you say that if they would like to leave a donation, that would be fine," she said.


